Dear Primarians and Friends around the country,

## “TRY WALKING IN MY SHOES”

Cerebral palsy is the most common physical disability in childhood, affecting movement and posture. One in three children with cerebral palsy are unable to walk. Many children with cerebral palsy access therapy to improve their walking ability and use mobility devices to improve their independence.

Annabelle is working towards increasing her walking endurance with the walking frame. The “GaitKeeper Treadmill” generously donated by The Primary Club of Australia to Cerebral Palsy Alliance provides Annabelle and others with a consistent and controlled environment, allowing them to achieve a high level of repetitive practice. The different speeds available on the treadmill support Annabelle’s therapists to challenge Annabelle’s step length and speed and allows for slower periods for Annabelle to actively rest.

Thank you, Primary Club of Australia, for supporting the health and wellbeing of children with cerebral palsy, like Annabelle.

Boccia is a precise ball sport, akin to bocce and related to bowls and pétanque. The name "boccia" is derived from the Latin word for "boss". The sport is contested at local, national and international levels, by athletes with severe physical disabilities.

The Primary Club funding has created an opportunity for us to supply 'start-up kits' for both these newly formed clubs - Bega Valley and Hunter - to concentrate their energy and focus on the members and creating an inclusive environment for people of all abilities from social to high performance levels that are fun, challenging and socially interactive within a connected Boccia community. ## THE BAGGY GREEN DINNER 2024

The 'Baggy Green Dinner' incorporating the Sir Roden Cutler Awards honouring the significance of representing one's country was held at the Sydney Cricket Ground Noble Dining Room on Thursday 25th September and was truly an inspirational experience, with 200 Members and guests in attendance.

The Sir Roden Cutler Award is named in honour of the longest-serving Governor of New South Wales, Sir Roden Cutler (Governor from 1966 to 1981) and our first Patron and Twelfth Man. The Award is presented for outstanding sporting achievement and contribution by a person with a disability.

Highlights included President Jim's 'interview' with former Aussie cricketer (and comedian) Wayne Phillips, plus a fireside chat between renowned journalists Peter Lalor and Mike Coward, and Stephanie Brantz MC'd the event, sharing official duties with Twelfth Man Mark Taylor, resplendent in his NSW Blazer, complete with Ansett boarding pass in the inside pocket. Stephanie conducted the award ceremony with grace, dignity and just a hint of emotion.

The finalists who each receive a charity grant of \$7,500 were introduced in the presence of Life Member Daphne Benaud and Dr Anthony Cutler (son of Sir Roden), who presented the finalists with their medals:

- Bronte Marshall, para-athlete, who has represented Australia in international swimming and rowing events winning multiple medals. She now serves the Community Rowing Club (Sydney), competing in regular regattas but also assisting other rowers at training and 'learn-to-row' classes.

- Rae Anderson, a dual summer and winter Paralympian and more recently a "Para Matilda". She now works as project coordinator at Disability Sports Australia and Cerebral Palsy Alliance.

- Koen Jansens, a former international basketballer representing Netherlands and teams in Italy and Spain. Koen is Co-Founder & Board Director of Wheelchair Basketball Australia (WBA). Koen's role in the formation of WBA has had a profound effect on wheelchair basketball opportunities and calibre of competition in Australia and will do so for many years to come. As Koen was unable to attend, his medal was accepted by fellow basketballer, Rhys Baxter, who proved to be an entertaining ambassador for the sport.

Special guests included joint PCA founder Peter Howarth OAM, Senator Dave Sharma, former NSW Minister for Sport Stuart Ayres, Life Members Daphne Benaud and Rick Glover OAM and 15 members of the Australia India Business Council.
